The Mosaic Institute Mission and objectives

Founded in 2008 and restructured in 2019, The Mosaic Institute has the mission of supporting social and economic transformation in the territories in which it is active.

Its programs have platforms featuring projects that impact the quality of food, water, education, and local development. The Mosaic Institute develops initiatives that build solid bases for the sustainable development of the communities, always aligned with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals.

We do this to fight social inequality, create infrastructure that promotes wellbeing, advance quality education, train local labor, and strengthen fundamental values such as ethics, collaboration, and responsibility. This will nourish a more dignified and fair Brazilian society.

The results we present in this report were made possible only thanks to the involvement of the employees of Mosaic Fertilizantes, who share this philosophy of social and economic development and to the engagement of business, local leadership, and public administrations.

Platforms

The Mosaic Institute is committed to transforming lives in the places Mosaic Fertilizantes is active. It does so through four platforms. They are at the same time distinct and complementary because all have the goal of promoting social and economic development of the communities.

Thanks to funding and engagement of partners, working in tandem with our employees, we managed to carry out projects and initiatives of critical importance in the locations where Mosaic was active in 2019.



In the Food Platform we offered training in healthy eating and food safety as well as initiatives that supported communities with food vulnerabilities.







(FOOD / VILLAGE)

We rely on two programs. One is the AlimentAÇÃO Program, which works with communities and schools offering social and educational activities, such as planting vegetable gardens. The Village Program, in turn, helps improve income of smallholder farmers.



In the Water Platform we valued and encouraged good practices in water management, supporting projects developed by social organizations and by higher learning and research institutions.





(WATER BIDDING PROGRAM)

Efforts focused on the first edition of the Water Bidding Program, designed to support initiatives that promote the availability of quality water.



EDUCATION

The objective of the Education Platform is to strengthen basic education by providing leadership and technical training and encouraging reading habits.





(MOSAIC EDUCATES)

The Mosaic Educates Program achieved dramatic results working in four cities, where it established reading rooms and promoted workshops and training sessions.



The Local Development Platform was created to train public administrators and empower communities, so as to build a more efficient and transparent public administration, in addition to encouraging social entrepreneurship in socially vulnerable communities.

World Food Day

(October 16)



Volunteers company-wide collected food items with the help of The Mosaic Institute, which matched all food donated.

Staple food baskets were donated to poor families in the cities of Ouvidor (GO) and Tapira (MG), which will become part of the program in 2020.

When matching the food donations, The Mosaic Institute bought from local retailers, provideding a boost to the local economy. In Catalão, Ouvidor, and Tapira food was also purchased from smallholder farmers and included in the staple food baskets donated to poor families.




Value and encourage water resources management practices

We introduced the first edition of the social bidding program to support initiatives that promote the availability of quality water.

Themes: Increase the amount and improve the quality of water, preserve and restore water sources, educate the population on the rational use and conservation of water.

Nine projects selected in eight municipalities of six states



- Community training program to implement septic tanks, by Associação Cerrado Vivo Para Conservação da Biodiversidade, in Patrocínio (MG)
- Integrated multi-trophic aquaculture, by the São Paulo State University (UNESP), in Cajati (SP)
- Treatment of the Uberaba River sub-basins using Moringa Oleifera, by the Federal University of the Minas Triangle (UFTM), in Uberaba (MG)
- Diagnostic of priority areas for forest restoration, by the University of Uberaba (UNIUBE), Uberaba (MG)
- Rainwater collection system, by Desafio Jovem Betel, in Paranaguá (PR)
- Mobile game for environmental education, by the Federal University of Rio Grande (FURG), in Rio Grande (RS)
- Planting Water Program filtering gardens, recycling, and composting, by Iniciativa Verde, in Cajati (SP)
- Water is Life reclaiming of water sources in the Macaúba community, by the Federal University of Catalão, in Catalão (GO)
- Training to conserve the Japaratuba River sub-basin, by the Water Mammals Foundation, in Capela and Rosário do Catete (SE)



The Water Mammals Foundation's main objective is to raise environmental awareness to the Japaratuba River basin. We offered lectures and workshops for students and teachers of six schools and a quilombola community, in five municipalities. Close to 400 people were impacted. There has already been a significant shift in knowledge about the basin. People are starting to see with other eyes the water source that supplies the region."





Social Entrepreneurship Program

Objectives:

- Incubate and accelerate social organizations to strengthen their entrepreneurship capacity and foster a positive impact.
- Make businesses self-sustainable so that they create social and environmental services for members of these organizations and of society.

Where: Cajati (SP) and Paranaguá (PR)

- Select social organizations benefited under the program to be incubated and accelerated.
- Start in June 2013 with a situational diagnosis in order to prepare the initiatives.
- Entrepreneurship courses to prepare a Business and Acceleration Plan.

Beneficiary organizations:

- Cajati Recycling Cooperative (COORECA) 24 cooperative members supported and 124 hours of training provided for people with an average monthly income of R\$400.
- Associação Mulheres Mãos de Ouro (AMMO) in Cajati Eight members supported and 116 hours of professional training provided to women with mostly no source of income.
- Encouraging association initiative of Associação Boas Novas, in Paranaguá.


